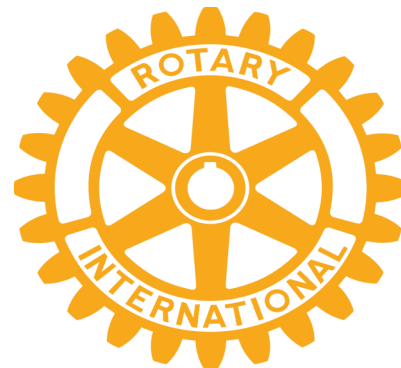

IOWA WESTERN COMMUNITY COLLEGE

This morning, Dr. Dan Kinney, Presi-
dent of Iowa Western Community College,
spoke to our
club. He
shared that
the college is
undergoing
several con-
struction
projects at
this time.

One of these
projects is
the construc-
tion of a
building
which will
house the
wrestling
and football
programs.

The upper floor of the building will be dedi-
cated to the wrestling program which gives
them a dedicated area. The middle area
will consist of offices and will showcase the
accomplishments of both of these pro-
grams. The lower level will consist of an
upgraded locker room for the football pro-
gram. He shared that the current locker

Greeter Assignments/Program Host Assignments & Room Set - Up Assignments

You have heard the adage that “it takes a village”, well we have that and then some with our club. Recently, Jaymes sent out information to the club as to responsibilities for Greeter/Program Hosts and Room Set Up assignments for all members of the club. Our newsletter will incorporate a rolling calendar as a reminder for when your turn is to come about. I thought it would be helpful to reiterate the information in that email as to responsibilities with each assignment.

Greeter: Although not new to our club but certainly new to many of our members, we will be bringing back our Greeter responsibilities. The newsletter will identify this assignment for the upcoming weeks for your convenience. Essentially your job as a greeter, is to do just that: greet our members and guests. Its great to have a friendly face greet you at the door so when it is your turn, please plan on being in the room by at least 7:00 a.m. If you are waiting for guests to arrive, you can always help out with setting up the room. It does not take long to do. Also, if you can't make it for your week, please try and switch with another Rotarian or contact Jaymes and let him know accordingly.

Program host/Room set up: This is a combined role. As you know, when you are the program host, you are responsible for setting up the program for that week. Once a program has been identified, please make sure you share that information with Jaymes and with Craig so we can make sure this information is shared with the rest of the club. If you need ideas for possible programs, please see Jaymes. In addition to the program for that day, you are also responsible for setting up the room and taking down the room both before and after the visit. If you have questions as to what is needed in setting the room up/where to find items, etc. please visit with Jaymes.

(room is not of sufficient size for each member of the team to have his own locker. Although the construction of the new building is behind, due to weather related delays, he still expects the building to be complete and ready for the teams in the late summer/fall of 2017.

Dan shared that Iowa Western is celebrating its 50th anniversary this year. Celebrations have been taking place already this year throughout the various campuses in Southwest Iowa.

As noted by Dan, the beauty of a community college is its ability to adapt to the needs of employers in educating and training individuals for potential employment. He shared an example of a manufacturing facility in Clarinda needing employees to help run its operations. Iowa Western was able to create a program to help fill this need.

The balance of his program focused on the funding of income for community colleges. He shared that community colleges in Kansas receive more than 50 percent of their annual funding from property taxes. This is not the case in Iowa. In Iowa, less than two percent is generated by property taxes. Dr. Kinney shared that approximately sixty-six percent of its income is generated from tuition with the balance coming from state funding. He shared the state funds Regent Universities, i.e. Iowa, Iowa State; private colleges and community colleges. However, the state does not fund each of these equally. Regent Universities receive \$10,900.00 per student. Private colleges receive \$4,020.00 per student. Community colleges receive \$2,394.00 per student. This past year increases were provided to each of these entities. Regent Universities saw an increase of \$108.00 per student. Private colleges saw an increase of \$686.00 per student and community colleges received an increase of \$30.00 per student. Due to the lack of funding at the community college level, Dr. Kinney stated they were forced to raise tuition by \$11.00 per credit hour to offset the limited state funds received.

As also mentioned this morning, Iowa Western hosts many fine arts events. He shared some future programs.
